RESOURCES FOR WORKING AT THE CPACS

[The MRC Manual](#) provides volunteers with the purpose, scope, and mission of the Medical Reserve Corps, while outlining the guidelines for how it operates. This is a valuable resource for volunteers. The manual is a short read if you have the time, but we will be featuring key tidbits in this newsletter, starting with the SLO MRC's purpose.

The purpose of the County of San Luis Obispo Medical Reserve Corps is to:

1. Organize and train healthcare professionals to respond to the specific needs of the community, thereby enhancing local emergency response efforts, especially during largescale local emergencies.
2. Provide reserve capacity at the community level to respond to local public and community health needs and education.
3. Create a framework to match medical volunteers' skills with the community's needs.
4. Draw health professionals into volunteer service.

COURSES & LEARNING

Typically Medical Reserve Corp Volunteers are required to complete [FEMA IS-700 "An Introduction to the National Incident Management System"](#), however, this has been waived for CPACS volunteers. This week we are encouraging our MRC members to go through the online course and complete the final exam to earn this certificate.

Once you pass this exam, the certification will be sent to you via email and has no expiration date. Please save this certificate to an accessible location on your computer for future verification by our team.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

- Q: What types of patients will CPACS be taking?**
The CPACS is designed to take ambulatory patients directly from local hospitals whose needs are between hospitalization and being ready for home care. We can provide supplemental oxygen, IV fluids, and minimal medications. Most patients are expected to stay at the CPACS from 2-4 days.
- The CPACS will NOT take patients from the Federal Institution Prison in Lompoc or the California Men's Colony.**
- Q: Will CPACS take patients from neighboring counties?**
We may accept civilian patients from neighboring County hospitals if requested. San Luis Obispo County Administrative Officer Wade Horton agreed that non-prisoner, noncritical patients from northern Santa Barbara County hospitals could use the alternative care site if the need arises.
- Q: Has the CPACS been reviewed and approved by the Fire Marshal?**
Yes, the CPACS has been inspected by the State Fire Marshal Fire for compliance with applicable fire safety measures and the CPACS has received the necessary Certificate of Occupancy for all 6 phases.
