- 1. <u>Determination of a Quorum and Introductions</u>
 - A quorum of 18 is established.
- 2. Approval of June 5, 2019 Meeting Minutes

Member C. Replogle suggests a change be made to previous minutes in Section 5 remove mention of CSD water agenda and replace is to read C. Replogle reported on the Oceano CSD.

A motion by Member L. Chipping which is seconded by Member C. Mulholland to approve amended meeting minutes. Motion carries (18-0-3)

- 3. Ongoing Updates:
 - a. Rain & Reservoir Report

Secretary R. Dienzo states that the summary of the rain from last water year shows all gauges are at or above 100%. He also states that Rocky Butte gauge has been added to the report.

b. Groundwater Basin Management Efforts

e. Various County Water Programs, Policies, and Ordinances

Member E. Greening states that the county and city should prepare to respond to revised draft environmental impact report on Cal Poly master plan as it nears completion, specifically addressing where the water will be coming from.

- f. Open Reporting on Water Conservation Opportunities & Information No comment.
- g. <u>Update on Hydraulic Study of the Adelaida Area</u>

Secretary R. Dienzo states that right now there are no policy decisions being made on the hydrologic study of Adelaida, because they are still in the study stage. The are currently refining the scope of work. Before it goes to the board, he suggests setting up

a subcommittee at the county to review and make recommendations to the board for setting up policies.

Member E. Greening suggests a review of other area's ordinances prior to reviewing the hydrologic study's ordinances.

4. <u>Presentation on Santa Barbara County Water Agency's Green Gardener Program and Watershed</u>
<u>Wise Landscape Training Programs by Tyrone LaFay from Santa Barbara County Water Agency</u>

Santa Barbara County Water Agency member Tyrone LaFay presented. The elements of this presentation were as follows:

- The Regional Water Efficiency Program is a voluntary program which develops budgets for water purveyors to pay depending on their water usage and production data from previous years; larger users pay larger percentages.
 - Website: waterwiseSB.org
- The Green Gardner Training Program is a bilingual training program for landscape maintenance professionals. Classes are taught in Santa Barbara City College. The class educates on increase conservation, reduction of pollution, sustainability and health of landscape. They provide resources such as soil probes and catch cans. The should the County of SLO adopt such a program it would partner with Cuesta College, and Janette from SBCC can be contacted for more information.
- Watershed Wise landscape Training concentrates on communication between the homeowner and professionals. There is a list of certified professions available to homeowners on the Santa Barbara County Water Agency's website. The training offers an EPA Watersense class.
- 5. <u>Presentation on Central Coast Water Board's (CCWB) Response to Climate Change by Dominic Roques, CCWB Staff</u>

CCWB staff Dominic Roques discussed the function of the water board, regional effects of climate change, and how the regional waterboard is responding to climate change. The elements of this presentation are as follows:

- The Regional Board consists of 7 government appointed volunteers that set standards and issue permits
- The 4th climate assessment released from the state addressed precipitation pattern and temperature changes, sea level rise, wildfires, industrial agriculture, and public health (harmful algal blooms)
- Climate change has disproportionate effects on vulnerable communities
- The Water board is increasing their internal coordination and awareness of the board
- The Board is modifying its orders and permits to include more mitigation efforts
- 11 billion gallons of treated wastewater are discharged into the ocean from the central coast
- The impacts of wildfires on water quality need to be identified and addressed (i.e. erosion, vegetation conversion)
- Legislation is motivating the agencies. Coordinate more to avoid inefficiencies.
- Cal adapt (UC Berkley) improve precipitation data: design storms for future scenarios
- The Waterboard's plan is based on 3 strategies:
 - o facilitation of adaptation measures
 - o continued collaboration with stakeholders

- knowledge of effect of adaptation measures
- 6. <u>Consider Forming Subcommittee for Collaboration with Agricultural Liaison Advisory Board</u> (ALAB) Regarding Water Conservation Issues

Member A. Pease introduces the future formation of an ad-hoc subcommittee for collaboration with ALAB which was previously suggested to increase agricultural water conservation.

A motion to create such a subcommittee is made by Member G. Kendall and seconded by. Member L. George. Motion carries (unanimous voice vote).

Members G. Kendall, J. Green, S. Wald, C. Replogle, and L. Siefert volunteered to participate in the subcommittee with member L. Siefert acting as chair of the effort.

Member J. Green suggests the subcommittee meetings be held at the Farm Bureau.

7. <u>Updates from the Cities on Water Issues Relevant to Their Group or Agency</u>

City of Grover Beach Member D. Lance goes over Grover Beach's previous council meeting that focused on water. Main elements are as follows:

- Grover beach has adopted a new master plan for their water which identifies 11.8 M dollars of capital improvement projects; 8 M dollars are needed for existing demands.
- Grover Beach is currently upgrading their 2-inch and 4-inch mains, and are working in tandem with roads upgrades
- Grover Beach is participating in the central coast blue project

City of Arroyo Grande is also participating in the central coast blue project.

City of SLO representative A. Pease states that the City of SLO has awarded a contract for their Water Resource Recovery Facility which is the biggest capital improvement project for the city. The city is now working to determine what the highest and best use of the water. She also addresses resilience in the water treatment plants and water supply facilities with PG&E power safety shut offs. The short-term solution is the use of generators and long-term solutions will include incorporating alternative power supplies. A. Pease closes by mentioning the participation of the city in energy efficiency.

Upper Salinas RCD representative Devin Best comments on current projects of Upper Salinas including irrigation evaluations, ground water recharge opportunities, soil health, and forest health.

8. <u>Discuss Future Agenda Items</u>

No comment.

9. Public Comment

Jean Pierre Wolfe comments on cloud seeding approval above Lopez Reservoir. He suggests that WRAC be involved in future review of project plans. He also mentions the Waterboard's full day workshop on the cross roads between water quality and homelessness coming up on October 3rd.

Member S. Wald mentions the creek and ocean clean up that will take place on September 21.

Basin	Update:
Los Osos Basin Fringe Area	The Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) requires DWR to reassess groundwater basin prioritization any time it updates Bulletin 118 basin boundaries. On April 30, 2019, DWR published the Draft SGMA 2019 Basin Prioritizations based on the 2019 Basin Boundary Modifications. Below are DWR's draft prioritizations for Los Osos Basin. • Los Osos Area Subbasin (adjudicated area) is listed as very low priority for SGMA¹ and in critical conditions of overdraft². Under SGMA, the court approved adjudicated area is exempt from the requirements of SGMA.

Atascadero Basin	 The Atascadero Basin was re-prioritized to a "very low" priority basin by the DWR in 2018 and is, therefore, not subject to SGMA requirements. The Executive Committee of the Atascadero Basin GSA has approved continuing with preparation of a GSP by January 31, 2022 in order to remain eligible for the Atascadero Basin's awarded GSP Development Grant Funds

d) Stormwater Resource Plan

California Senate Bill No. 985 requires the development of a stormwater resource plan (SWRP) for public agencies to receive grant funds for stormwater and dry weather runoff capture projects.

The City of Arroyo Grande and the County of San Luis Obispo collaborated on the development of a region-wide SWRP. The SWRP must be compliant with the State Water Board's SWRP Guidelines adopted December 15, 2015 and the California Water Code Section 10561-10573. The work completed by the City of Arroyo Grande with Grant Agreement D1612607 is being combined with Task 12 of the County's Department of Water Resources IRWM Planning Grant (Agreement No. 4600011892).

The goals of the County of San Luis Obispo SWRP are to identify and prioritize stormwater and dry weather runoff capture projects in the county through detailed analyses of watershed conditions and processes, surface and groundwater resources, and the multiple benefits that can be achieved through stormwater-related capital projects and other programmatic actions.

Project Updates

- The Final SWRP is currently being reviewed by the State Water Resources Control Board. Concurrence is expected in October 2019.
- The Final SWRP report and appendices are available for viewing on the County's website: www.slocounty.ca.gov/pw/swrp
- Solicitation for Proposition 1- Implementation Round 2 grant funding is expected to open in late 2019 and close Spring 2020. Approximately \$90 million is available statewide.

e) Various County Water Programs, Policies, and Ordinances

Amending the Water Neutral New Development Ordinances for the Paso Robles Groundwater Basin

On June 18, 2019, the Board directed staff to consider amendments to Title 19 and Title 22 to extend the 1:1 water offset requirement for new construction and for new and expanded irrigated crop production overlying the Paso Robles Groundwater Basin. This offset requirement is currently set to expire with the adoption of the Groundwater Sustainability Plan (GSP). The proposed amendments extend the expiration date for five years until January 2025 to allow time for the new management actions established by the GSP to be implemented, so there is not a "gap". The proposed amendments also modify the Agriculture Offset Ordinance to 1) eliminate the option of transferring water credits off-site, 2) include a water duty factor for hemp, 3) include a process for issuing water duty factors for unlisted crops, and 4) include a method for determining historic on-site water use. On September 12, 2019, the Planning Commission recommended approving the proposed amendments with the exception of preserving the ability to transfer water credits off-site for the Ag Offset Program. The Board hearing is scheduled for November 5, 2019. For more information, visit

Paso Robles Groundwater Basin (PRGWB) and the Nipomo Mesa Water Conservation Area (NMWCA) – The County is continuing to process building permits that are subject to the fees of the PRGWB and the NMWCA. The Cash for Grass program offers \$1 per square foot up to a maximum rebate amount of \$6,000 per household. The Washer Rebate Program offers \$250 per household when replacing an old washer with a new water efficient washer (replacement must save at least 15 gallons). The Plumbing Retrofit Program offers homeowners the opportunity to replace old fixtures with new water efficient fixtures in their homes (limited to 2 toilets, 2 showerheads, and 2 faucet aerators) at no cost from the homeowner.

Los Osos – The retrofit to build program within the community of Los Osos is allowing property owners to retrofit washers within and outside the prohibition zone to acquire retrofit credits. At this time, to earn enough credits to build one single family residence (300 credits), a property owner would need to replace 6-8 washers; a total cost ranging between \$4,000-\$6,000.


