The MHSA Vision

The MHSA pledges to **look beyond “business as usual” to help build a system where **access** will be easier, services are **more effective**, out-of-home and institutional care are **reduced** and **stigma** toward those with severe mental illness or serious emotional disturbance no longer exists.**





MHSA planning benefits from community stakeholder input

Annual Update: CSS Highlights FY18/19

Community Services & Supports Outcomes included:

- **Community Action Team (CAT)
Community Liaison**
 - 291 individuals engaged; over 400 contacts
- **TMHA Wellness Centers**
 - 3,000 contacts
 - 33% increase in coping skills to help manage mental health symptoms
- **Veterans' treatment programs**
 - 109 Veterans served
 - Clients demonstrate 88% improvement in ability to handle stress

Annual Update: Prevention & Early Intervention (PEI) Highlights FY18/19

Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI) programs continue to successfully address targeted risk populations.


Middle School Comprehensive Program

- Over 830 have been served (families and children)
- Students demonstrated **an increase of 28% in protective factors**, and a **decrease of 26% in risk factors**.
- Youth participating achieve **better outcomes in leadership** and advocacy, as well as **learning** and **school bonding** than general student population.



MHSA Fiscal Update

MHSA Revenue and Expenses FY 18/19 – Projected FY 20/21



MHSA Fiscal Update

- **Fund Balance 03/20/2020 (excluding Prudent Reserve) = \$14,925,935**
- **Prudent Reserve Fund Balance = \$2,774,412**
- **CSS Details:**
 - 76% of funding
 - Full Service Partnership = Majority of CSS Funding (51%)
- **PEI Details:**
 - 19% of funding
