








Results from Retrospective Surveys

• Overall, participating students reported a 49% increase in their ability to know how to better cope with stress, depression, and anxiety.

I know how to better cope with stress, depression, and anxiety






Family Advocate Results

- Annually, Family Advocates have provided information and referrals to 232 unique/unduplicated total contacts (children, youth, and parents)
- 67 or 29% (67/232) youth were provided with intensive case management services
- 52 or 78% (52/67) youth and their families/caregivers receiving case management services progressed in school attendance and behavior
- 17 or 89% (17/19) of managed cases showed progress on a scale of 1 to 5 in the integral components of SAFE (SAFE, At home, In School, Healthy, and Out of Trouble)



FNL Results from Youth Development Surveys

- Learning and School Bonding
 - 84% of youth report FNL provides sufficient to strong opportunities for school bonding/engagement
 - 92% of youth report FNL provides sufficient to strong opportunities for community engagement and to develop caring relationships with peers and adults





Innovation (INN)

- Offer creative approaches to persistent challenges
- Build on successful approaches not currently considered part of mental health delivery
- Challenge existing paradigms; change the status quo
- Experiment and take risks
- Communicate about mental illness and mental health in different words
- Think in different categories





MHSA Fiscal Update

• FY 2019/20 Adopted Budget is \$20.3M (MHSA \$16.1M/Other Revenue \$4.2M)

➤CSS: \$15.5M

➤ PEI: \$2.7M ➤ INN: \$1.3M ➤ WET: \$167K

>CFTN (Electronic Health Record Support): \$518K

- Fund Balance 07/01/2018 (excluding PR) = \$11,456,955
- CSS Update:
 - Full Service Partnership Majority of CSS Funding (51%)
 - o FY 19/20 current budget approximately 43%
- PEI Update:
 - > \$150K additional funding available for new or expansion of current programs.



Prudent Reserve (PR) Transfer

- Prudent Reserve (PR) Balances:
 - CSS: \$5,768,556
 - PEI: \$67,608
- SB 192 33% max of CSS 5 year avg (\$2.7M)
- FY 2019/20 propose transferring back to CSS & PEI
- PEI reserve to fund CalMHSA annual fee
- Request for Approval to Transfer

Forensics Division Manager

Justification

Fund .50 FTE Behavioral Health Division Manager to create a unique forensic cooccurring division with the BH Department which will allow to focus clinical and admin support to some of the most difficult to serve individuals in our community

Cost

76,542.00 Annual Increase for 3 years: Total \$229,626





Request for Approval for New or Additional Funding

Bishop Street Case Manager Justification

Fund 1.0 FTE Case Manager for Bishop Street to assist clients in developing problem-solving skills related to daily living, housing, managing chronic symptoms of illness, decreasing psychiatric hospitalizations and employment. CM will also assist residents with cooking, cleaning, conflict resolution, budgeting, socialization and community integration.

Cost

\$93,375.00 Annual Increase for 3 years: Total \$280,125.00

Fund 1.0 FTE Administrative assistant and face-to-face psychiatry when needed

Cost

Expand Promotores to serve clients with co-occurring and to provide interpretation services to additional clients

Cost

\$21,000 Annual Increase
