4.3. Discussion Item: Special Full Meeting in June	Laurel reported that County staff will be sending out a Doodle poll to arrange a Special meeting of the full HSOC in June, which is likely to be an in person meeting. This meeting will be needed to approve the new strategic plan in time for Board of Supervisors approval in July.	
4.4. Discussion Item: State and Federal Homeless Assistance Grants		
4.4.1. Discussion Item: Current Grants	Laurel reported that the State has allowed an extension of the expenditure deadline for the California ESG-CV (Emergency Solutions Grant – Coronavirus) grant program. The expenditure deadline is now September. County staff are working with subrecipients to prepare for reallocation of funding that would not otherwise be spent before the expenditure deadline. Scott raised concerns that more funding processes create barriers in terms of local implementation, for example Federal Environmental Reviews, which can make the contracting process take months or even years. Agencies can receive final contracts a long time after the NOFA (Notice of Funding Availability) is	
	released, and then have to manage short expenditure deadlines.	
4.4.2. Discussion Item: Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program	Laurel presented an overview of the HHAP (Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program) Round 3 funding program. The County and CoC (Continuum of Care) are applying jointly. HHAP 3 is a two year funding program, for which total funding	

(HHAP) Round 3 Funding	will be around \$4.3 million. Approximately 10% of the total funding will be set aside for youth services, and 7% will be set aside for grant administration. A further \$1 million will be prioritized for systems improvements – this represents the funding made available in the first tranche. The HHAP 3 program will be performance based, requiring quantitative goals on System Performance Measures. An 18% bonus will be available for grantees that meet their goals. Applicants also need to develop strategies to use to achieve these goals. These will be aligned with recommendations from the Steering Committee. The State will be using HMIS (Homeless Management Information System) data from 2020, which presents a challenge as the 2020 data was anomalous due to the impact of COVID, which artificially decreased the number of people experiencing homelessness for the first time. Applicants are required to publicly notice goals and strategy, which can be in the form of an initial draft, and seek public input. Public hearing time has been scheduled at the Board of Supervisors meeting on May 17 th .

Scott reported that the Housing Committee met and heard a	Services Coordinating Committee to discuss Tiny House Villages.

Devin reported that the Services Coordinating Committee met and discussed staff shortages among nonprofit agencies and County departments, and the challenges of filling gaps with interns and volunteers. The Committee also discussed safe parking and sanctioned encampments, and the importance of defining sites to avoid setting expectations. The upcoming Services Coordinating Committee will discuss a proposed Tiny Homes concept from Hope's Village.

Homeless Services Oversight Council Executive Committee Meeting – June 15 2022 Committee Updates

HSOC Finance & Data Committee Meeting – April 26

- PIT (Point in Time) Count Update County staff reported on progress in validating data from the sheltered count and the Housing Inventory Count (HIC). The data is due to HUD (US Department of Housing and Urban Development) at the end of April, with more detailed data being available around June-July.
- Data Maturity Assessment Tool County staff reported on progress made in areas identified for improvement, including ensuring all projects are entering data into HMIS (Homeless Management Information System). The Committee discussed challenges around improving data quality, e.g. the difficulty of collecting data with low barrier programs. County staff recommended that it may be possible to set different data benchmarks for different project types, and will report back at the next meeting.
- Grant Updates County staff reported that the expenditure deadline for ESG-CV (Emergency Solutions Grant Coronavirus) has been extended by a year, but HUD (US Department of Housing and Urban Development) is also requiring 50% of the funding to be expended by mid-June. The County may release another RFP (Request for Proposals) for reallocation of ESG-CV funding, depending on whether HCD (California Department of Housing and Community Development) meets this requirement. The County also reported on the release of an RFP for the annual ESG program.
- HMIS (Homeless Management Information System) County staff reported that HMIS will be
 using an umbrella release form instead of the current 815 form, to allow participating agencies
 access to all the data. The next step is to approve the new HMIS Release of Information forms,
 but this could not be achieved as the meeting did not have a quorum.

HSOC Finance & Data Committee Meeting – May 24

- HMIS (Homeless Management Information System) Release of Information Forms voted on and approved by the committee. The new forms enhance data sharing and data quality, improve communication between partners, and improve Coordinated Entry implementation. This item was subsequently voted on and approved by the full HSOC at their Special meeting in June.
- HHAP 3 (Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program) Round 3 County staff
 presented on HHAP 3 funding and the outcome goals established by the state. The committee
 voted on and approved the draft outcome goals and strategies. This item was due to be voted
 on by the full HSOC at their Special meeting in June, but prior to this meeting the state clarified
 that they do not want the CoC (Continuum of Care) to vote on outcome goals and strategies at
 this time, so the full HSOC vote was tabled.
- Strategic Plan County staff presented on the Data line of effort from the draft strategic plan. The full draft strategic plan will be presented to the full HSOC in July.

HSOC Housing Committee Meeting – May 3

- Strategic Plan to End Homelessness Susan Funk reported on the Board of Supervisors approving the framework for the new Plan, and the progress the steering committee is making in working through the draft plan, including an overall goal of cutting the number of homeless people to 50% of the current level in five years, and the basic strategies for achieving this, such as adding affordable housing capacity and non-traditional solutions.
- Federal and State Grants County staff reported on the HHAP (Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program) Round 3 grant, which will tie into the goals for the Strategic Plan. A Special full meeting of the HSOC will be held in June to review goals for the HHAP 3 application.

HSOC Housing Committee - Meeting June 7

- Strategic Plan to End Homelessness County staff provided an update on the steering committee's progress on the draft plan. The Housing Committee discussed the housing that will need to be added to the plan to meet its outcomes, including Permanent Supportive Housing, alternative housing models, interim housing and affordable units. The Committee provided feedback on what will be needed to meet RHNA (Regional Housing Needs Allocation) goals. One challenge addressed was the different regulations set up by different jurisdictions within the county. The Committee agreed to bring its next meeting forward by a week so there will be another chance to discuss the draft strategic plan before the full HSOC votes on it.
- San Luis Obispo County Housing Needs Report the committee discussed the data in this report from California Housing Partnership, and recommended convening a group with expertise to look closer at RHNA numbers.
- Federal and State Grants County staff provided updates on the annual Continuum of Care grant, for which the NOFA (Notice of Funding Availability) is expected imminently, and plans for local applications for HHAP Rounds 2 and 3, which will be combined into one Request for Proposals (RFP).
- Housing Developers HASLO (Housing Authority of San Luis Obispo) shared that they are
 waiting on approval from the City of Pismo Beach for a new construction project of 29 units for
 very low and extremely low income seniors.
