

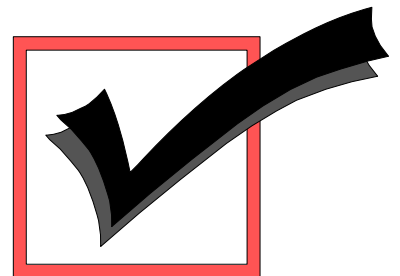

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WHAT'S NEW THIS ELECTION

COST CUTTING MEASURES

As the County struggles with budget deficits, we continue to look for ways to cut election costs, while maintaining a high level of service to our voters.

- **Permanent Vote-by-Mail Voters and Voters within Mail Ballot Precincts will only receive one mailing from the County.**

The sample ballot booklet mailed to each voter contains a copy of their ballot, candidate statements and information on local measures as well as notification of the voter's polling place and an application for a vote-by-mail ballot. In the past, this booklet was mailed to every voter whether they were signed up to vote by mail or not. For this and future elections, we have designed a vote by mail insert which includes all the information in the sample ballot booklet, except notification of the polling place assigned to the voter and the application for a vote by mail ballot. The 77,000 voters who are signed up as permanent vote-by-mail or reside in a mail ballot precinct for this election will be mailed this insert along with their vote-by-mail ballot. This insert contains fewer pages than the booklet making it less expensive to print and by inserting it with the vote by mail ballot, postage for the separate mailing for these voters is eliminated. In addition, voters will receive all the information on the local candidates and measures at the same time as their ballot. Every voter household will also receive the state voter information guide which contains candidate statements for statewide candidates and all the information on the state propositions, including the full text and the arguments supporting and opposing the measure.

- **Election Day Ballots will be counted at the Elections Office after the close of polls on Election night .**

This is a measure we have implemented for every election since the special election in May, 2009. While it was originally instituted as a cost savings measure by reducing delivery costs and staff salaries for testing the equipment, the biggest benefit is that it returns control of the ballot counting to the staff of the Clerk-Recorder's Office. When the Accuvote precinct ballot counters were deployed to the polling places, questions about the chain of custody of the machines, even with the required tamper-evident security seals and procedures in place, were inevitable. In addition, there were machine failures during the day, necessitating staff to travel to the polling place to either fix the machine or deploy a new one. On election night, one or two of the memory cards would fail to upload, requiring that the ballots be recounted. By counting the ballots at the elections office, under the control of the Clerk-Recorder staff, we can ensure that every ballot is accounted for, accurately counted and, if it cannot be counted due to damage, that it is correctly processed for duplication during the canvass.

The June 9, 2010 primary was the first major election that this procedure was used and we were not pleased with the process. Due to the number of parties, contests on the

ballot and length of time to print the final reports on the Accuvotes, the final election results were not available until 2:30 a.m. Understandably this was frustrating to the candidates and the media alike, as well as our staff who had to endure a 20+ hour day and be back at work by 8:00 a.m. the next morning. In reviewing our procedures we identified several areas where the work flow and process can be improved, including additional teams to return some of the north and south county precinct ballots earlier in the evening. We believe that with these improvements final results should be available by midnight, at the latest.

ACCESSIBILITY FEATURES AVAILABLE ON WEBSITE

With funding from a Help America Voter Act grant, the County Clerk-Recorder has photographed all polling places in the county and documented the accessibility features, including parking, path of travel and equipment that can be used by voters with special needs to access their polling place. Voters will also be able to view a sample of their ballot and get directions to their polling place. These features can be found in the polling place lookup feature on the Clerk-Recorder's website (www.slocounty.ca.gov/clerk) and will be a valuable tool to help voters easily identify their polling place and how to navigate to the room where the polls are located.

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WEBSITE LOOKUP FOR VOTER REGISTRATION STATUS AND VOTE-BY-MAIL BALLOTS

We are excited to be able to offer voters this new tool for their use. Voters can check to make sure they are registered to vote at their current address and track their vote-by-mail status using one screen. The voter is required to enter street address, birthdate and last 4 digits of their driver's license and if an exact match is found, their registration status will be confirmed and their vote-by-mail ballot status information for the current election will be displayed. To maintain voter confidentiality, the system will not display the voter's name or address but will merely confirm their registration status. The system will be updated daily with both registration and vote-by-mail status information. If the voter is unable to find the information on the web, they can continue to contact our office by phone at 781-5228 or by email at elections@co.slo.ca.us.

INSUFFICIENT CANDIDATES

School and Special Districts

The Elections Code provides that if, for any contest, the number of candidates who have filed papers is less than or equal to the number of positions available, the candidates will not be placed on the ballot and will be appointed in lieu of election. Any candidate so appointed shall serve as though he or she was elected.

The following school districts had insufficient candidates and will not be on the ballot:

Cities

The Elections Code provides that if, for all contests the number of candidates who have filed papers is less than or equal to the number of positions available, the city can pass a resolution cancelling the election and appointing the candidates who filed nomination papers in lieu of election. The City of Grover Beach has adopted such a resolution and there will be no city contests on the ballot.

PLACEMENT ON THE BALLOT/ROTATION OF CANDIDATES

The order in which candidates' names appear on the ballot is determined by a random drawing of the 26 letters of the alphabet. This random drawing is conducted by the Secretary of State and the County Clerk-Recorder prior to each election. The random drawing for the November 2, 2010 election was held on August 12th.

Election law also requires the names of candidates for some offices to change positions, such as federal, statewide and county wide offices (i.e. Governor, United States Senator, Secretary of State, United States Representative and Sheriff). The purpose of the rotation is so one candidate's name does not always appear first, or last, on all of the ballots for the races.

As required by state law, names of candidates for certain offices are rotated on the ballot as follows:

OFFICE	ROTATION
Statewide Offices, United States Representative, Board of Equalization member	Candidates' names are arranged in accordance with the alphabetical drawing beginning with the lowest numbered Assembly District in the State or Congressional or Board of Equalization District. Thereafter, for each succeeding Assembly District, the candidate's name

	appearing first is placed last; the order of the other names remains unchanged. Since San Luis Obispo County is represented by only one Assembly District, these candidates will be in the same order on every ballot in this county.
State Assembly	For multi-county districts, such as the 33rd Assembly (San Luis Obispo and Santa Barbara) each county conducts a random drawing and the candidates' names are arranged in accordance with each county's alphabetical drawing- no other rotation.
Sheriff-Coroner	Candidates' names are arranged in accordance with the alphabetical drawing in the 1st District. Thereafter for each succeeding Supervisorial District, the candidate's name appearing first is placed last and the order of the other names remains unchanged. With two candidates, Joe Cortez will be first on the ballot in the 1st, 3rd and 5th districts and Ian Parkinson will be first in the 2nd and 4th districts.

VOTE –BY- MAIL BALLOT INFORMATION

History: Absentee ballots were first made available by the North for the soldiers and sailors in the Civil War. California first allowed absentee voting in 1920 for those who were ill or disabled, lived too far from the polls and other special circumstances. In 1978 legislation was passed which allowed universal absentee voting. As a result of this change allowing any person to vote absentee (now vote-by-mail), it has become a very popular means to cast a ballot. See the chart on page 8 to track the trend of voters casting their ballots by mail. In 2002, permanent absentee voting was expanded to any voter upon request. There are currently over 74,000 permanent vote-by-mail voters in San Luis Obispo County totaling more than 48% of the total registered voters.

How To Apply for a Vote-by-Mail Ballot:

The first day this office can issue a vote-by-mail ballot for the General Election is October 4, 2010 (29 days before the election). Vote-by-mail ballot requests must be received no later than October 26th in order for the ballot to be mailed to the voter. After that date the voter must appear in the Office of the County Clerk-Recorder and complete an application

indicating the reason they cannot appear at the polls on Election day. Vote-by-mail ballots may be requested in one of four ways:

By filling out and mailing the Vote by Mail Application on the back cover of the sample ballot booklet.

By letter to the County Clerk-Recorder, 1055 Monterey St., D120 San Luis Obispo CA 93408. The letter must state the voter's name, residence address, address to which the ballot should be sent and voter's signature.

In person at the County Clerk-Recorder's Office- in San Luis Obispo at the address above or for voters living in the North County, at our office in Atascadero- 5955 Capistrano Ave., Suite B. The office hours in Atascadero are 7:30-4:00.

By faxing a written request to the County Clerk-Recorder's Office at 781-1111.

Vote-by-mail ballots cannot be requested over the telephone as a written request from the voter is required.

To be counted, the voted ballot must be mailed in time to be received by the County Clerk-Recorder's office by 8:00 p.m. on November 2, 2010 or returned by the voter personally to any polling place in the county no later than 8:00 p.m. on Election Day. It is recommended that voters do not mail ballots after the Friday prior to the election to ensure that the ballot will be received in time to be counted. The voter may also authorize a designated family member to return the voted ballot to any polling place in the county or to the County Clerk-Recorder's Office.

WEEKEND VOTING

The County Clerk-Recorder's Office will be open on the Saturday before the election from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. to issue vote-by-mail ballots. Voters may vote the ballot in the office at the voting booths or have a family member return the ballot for them by 8:00 p.m. on Election Day.

PREPARING FOR THE ELECTION
THE READER'S DIGEST VERSION
E-120 TO ELECTION DAY

The staff of the County Clerk-Recorder's Office begins preparation for a county wide election at least four months prior to election day and after that every day is counted as E- the number of days left. You could ask any employee in our office (and probably any candidate) how many days until the election and we won't even have to think twice to answer. Some of the important dates and the activities surrounding them are:

E minus number	Date	Activity
E-113	July 12	Opening of the nomination period.
E-88	August 6	Close of the nomination period. After the close of nomination, the ballot layout and preparation begins. Proofing of the sample ballots and ballot information continues through early August. The vote-by-mail ballots are received by the end of September and the sample ballot mailing is completed around the same time.
E-60	September 3	60 day close. This is the initial target date for ensuring that the voter rolls are as updated as possible. Any voter registration in our office by that date is processed into the system and all changes and deletes are accomplished before officially closing our files. The 60 day close file is sent to the Secretary of State and the printer who prepares and mails San Luis Obispo County sample ballots. These names constitute the first mailing of state ballot pamphlets and sample ballot pamphlets. Any changes or anyone who registers between this date and the 29 day close of registration (October 4th) will be mailed the voter information in the second mailing, scheduled for mailing the week of October 12th.
E- 56 to E-14	September 7 to October 19	Write-in candidate nomination period.
E-40	September 23	Sample Ballot booklets are mailed to voters who have not signed up to be a permanent vote-by-mail voter or do not live in a mail ballot precinct.
E-43 to E-20	September 20 to October 13	Testing of voting machines and ballot counting software. Certification to transmit election night results to the Secretary of State.
E-29	October 4	The "informed voter" close of registration as well

		as the first day to issue vote-by-mail ballots. Vote-by-mail ballots are mailed to the 77,000 voters who are signed up a permanent VBM voters and to those who live in mail ballot precincts. During the week of the close of registration, staff is busy processing voter registrations. These must be completed by the end of the week so new voters can be sent their sample ballot booklets and state voter information guides in a timely manner. While this is going on the voting booths and precinct supplies are being prepared for delivery to the county's 137 precincts and last minute changes to precinct worker assignments are made. During the month of October, staff is conducting 15 training sessions for the 700+ volunteers working at the polls.
E-15	October 18	Official close of registration. Anyone registered between October 5 and October 18 is eligible to vote however, the voter will not receive the state voter information guide or the county sample ballot booklet. The voter will receive a postcard indicating their polling place location and where they can obtain voter information.
E-11	October 22	Elections staff begins opening and preparing the vote-by-mail ballots for counting.
E-10	October 23	Elections staff begins counting the vote-by-mail ballots. No results are released until after the close of polls on Election Night.
E-7	October 26	Copy of ballot counting software is deposited with the Secretary of State.
E-7	October 26	Last day to mail vote-by-mail ballots to voters. After this day, a voter must appear in the office to receive a ballot. The final week before the election precinct supplies are distributed to the precinct inspectors.
E-2	October 31	Delivery crew picks up voting booths, ballot box and other equipment for delivery to polls
E-1	November 1	Delivery crews delivers and sets up voting equipment at 72 polling places throughout the county.
E Day	November 2	Polls are open from 7:00 am to 8:00 pm Election day begins at 6:00 a.m. and should end around 1:00 am for the County Clerk-Recorder staff, although final election night results should be completed by 12:30 am

E+1	November 3	Delivery crew picks up and returns all voting equipment to the Elections warehouse. Election staff records number of outstanding vote-by-mail and provisional ballots
E+2	November 4	Official Canvass begins – see process outline below.
E+28	November 30	Official canvass completion and election certification deadline.

PRECINCT OFFICERS AND POLLING PLACES

The November 2, 2010 Consolidated General Election involves 137 precincts at 72 different polling places and requires 700 volunteers to staff them. In San Luis Obispo County, we rely on public buildings and churches for our polling places. Using these buildings gives more stability to the polling place locations and does not leave the voters and precinct workers susceptible to poor weather and changes to locations because of vacations or illnesses. However, the demand for use of these buildings is great and, although our local agencies, schools and churches have been very cooperative in ensuring that we have sufficient space available, some polling places may change from the last election due to scheduling conflicts. The voter's polling place location and address is listed on the back of their sample ballot booklet and voters are encouraged to check this information before going to the polls on election day. Polling place information is also available on the Internet at www.slocounty.ca.gov/clerk. The voter enters their residence address and zip code and the website will display the polling place as well as the precinct number and ballot type. The ballot type is used to access the sample ballot booklet for the voter which contains the candidate statements, measure text and arguments for those contests on their ballot.

ELECTION NIGHT PROCEDURES

After the last voter in line at 8:00 has cast their ballot, the precinct workers pack up and return precinct materials and the voted ballots in sealed containers to either the regional collection centers or directly to the Elections office in San Luis Obispo. Elections staff verifies that all ballots and required materials have been received and that security measures have been followed prior to releasing the precinct workers. All ballots and materials are brought to the Government Center in San Luis Obispo for ballot counting and secure storage.

SPEED OF BALLOT COUNTING ELECTION NIGHT

As in the past, results of early vote-by-mail ballots (those received by Saturday, October 30th will be available immediately after 8:00 pm. As in the most recent elections, the ballots will be counted centrally in the County Clerk-Recorder's office on Election Night instead of at the polls during the day. The ballots will be transported from our regional collection centers in Paso Robles, Atascadero, Morro Bay and Arroyo Grande and fed through the Accuvote scanners by county staff. Final election night results should be available by 12:00 a.m.

INCOMPLETE BALLOT COUNTING ELECTION NIGHT

The public is often surprised on the day after a major election when they learn that there are as many as 15,000 ballots county wide remaining to be counted after the election. There are three categories of ballots which cannot be processed on Election Night:

1. **VOTE-BY-MAIL BALLOTS TURNED IN ELECTION DAY-** Many vote-by-mail voters wait until Election Day to make their voting choices and then drop off their ballots at a polling place. These ballots are received after the polls close on election night. All vote-by-mail ballots must be pre-processed before they are counted- including entering that the ballot has been returned to protect against double voting and verifying every voter's signature against the signature on file in our office.
2. **PROVISIONAL BALLOTS-** Provisional Ballots are voted at the polls when the precinct workers cannot determine the voter's eligibility to vote in that election. Provisional ballots are sealed in special envelopes and must be individually researched and verified at the County Clerk-Recorder's Office before the ballots are counted or rejected in accordance with election laws. There are several reasons why someone would be required to vote a provisional ballot at the polling location:

Voter is listed as having received a vote-by-mail ballot yet does not have the ballot to surrender at the polls.

Voter is voting under the fail safe provisions of the National Voting Rights Act. A fail safe voter is a registered voter in this county, who has moved and did not re-register to vote or notify the elections office of his/her change of address.

Voter's name is not on the roster, but the voter insists they are eligible to vote in that precinct.

Voter is required to show identification as a first time voter under the Help America Vote Act and cannot produce the required identification.

In each of these instances, the elections staff must verify that the voter is eligible to vote the ballot they were issued and verify the voter's signature prior to opening the ballot for processing. The number of provisional ballots continues to climb and in the November 2008 election there were 3,716 provisional ballots requiring about 400 hours of staff time to verify, open and count.

3. **DAMAGED BALLOTS:** Election Day ballots that are unable to be processed by the ballot scanners because of stray marks, overvotes or tears and need to be duplicated.

The majority of the vote-by-mail ballots are counted by the Friday after the election.

Some of these ballots require additional processing and their count is completed in the week following the election. The provisional and damaged ballots are normally counted just prior to certification of the results. Results are released as a count is completed and a schedule of counting dates and times will be posted on the County Clerk-Recorder website after the election.

**WRAPPING UP THE ELECTION
WHAT IS THE OFFICIAL CANVASS?**

The election canvass process is an internal audit required by state law to ensure the accuracy of election results. California election law allows 28 days to conduct the official canvass of final election results. The official canvass begins on Thursday, November 4 and must be concluded within 28 days, no later than November 30. San Luis Obispo County normally completes the official canvass within 17 days of the election. All aspects of the canvass are open to the public. The canvass concludes with the certification and issuance of official election results. Listed below are the major components of the official canvass.

Completion of the count for vote-by-mail and provisional ballots- as described above.

Election Materials accounted for- Staff verifies that all elections materials have been returned and accounted for and that precinct workers have correctly followed Election Day procedures.

Roster Reconciliation- Following the close of the polls on Election Day, precinct officers are responsible for completing the Official Ballot Statement shown below.

As part of the official canvass, the signatures in each roster are re-counted and the number of signatures indicated by the inspector on the roster is compared to the number of ballots tabulated by the computer tally system. Any discrepancies are investigated. The

balancing process normally takes 10 days to complete.

Manual Vote Tally- All voted ballots, including vote-by-mail ballots, from 1% of the 137 precincts are manually tallied and balanced against the computer counts to verify the accuracy of the election tally system. The completion of the manual tally usually takes 2-4 days, depending on the number of contests on the ballot and the voter turnout.

Apply Voting History- All voters who voted at the polls are given credit for voting.

Account for all ballots- The number of precinct and vote-by-mail ballots printed, issued and unused are accounted for and balanced. Discrepancies are investigated.

Certify Election and report to the Secretary of State - Registrar of Voters certifies the Election and sends the certification, statement of vote and supplemental statement of vote to the Secretary of State. Board item is prepared to present to the Board of Supervisors.

The state assembly candidates listed below have pledged to abide by the campaign spending limits as specified in the CA. Government Code. BOND AUTHORIZATION

By approval of this proposition by at least 55 percent of the registered voters voting on the proposition, the District will be authorized to issue and sell bonds of up to \$117 million in aggregated principal at interest rates below the legal limit and to provide financing for the specific school facilities projects listed in the Bond Project List described below, subject to all the accountability requirements specified below.

ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS

The provisions in this section are specifically included in this proposition in order that the voters and taxpayers in the District may be assured that their money will be spent wisely. Expenditures to address specific facilities needs of the District will be in compliance with the requirements of Article XIII A, Section 1(b)(3), of the State Constitution and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000 (codified at Education Code Sections 15264 and following) and California Government Code Section 53410 and following.

Evaluation of Needs. The School Board has identified detailed facilities needs of the District and has determined which projects to finance from a local bond at this time. Independent Citizens’ Oversight Committee. The School Board shall establish an Independent Citizens’ Oversight Committee under Education Code Section 15278 and following to ensure bond proceeds are expended only on the school facilities projects listed below. The committee will be established within 60 days of the date when the results of the election appear in the minutes of the School Board.

Performance Audits. The School Board shall conduct an annual, independent performance audit to ensure that the bond proceeds have been expended only on the school facilities projects listed below.

Financial Audits. The School Board shall conduct an annual, independent financial audit of the bond proceeds until all of those proceeds have been spent for the school facilities projects listed below.

Special Bond Proceeds Account: Annual Report to Board. Upon approval of this proposition and the sale of any bonds approved, proceeds of the bonds will be deposited into a Building Fund to be held by the San Luis Obispo County Treasury, as required by the California Education Code. As long as any proceeds of the bonds remain unexpended, the Superintendent of the District shall cause an annual report to be filed with the Board of Trustees of the District not later than January 1 of each year, which report shall contain pertinent information regarding the amount of funds collected and expended, as well as the status of the projects listed in the proposition, as required by Sections 53410 and 53411 of the California Government Code.

FURTHER SPECIFICATIONS

No Administrator Salaries. Proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition shall be used only for the construction, reconstruction and/or rehabilitation of school facilities including the

furnishing and equipping of school facilities or acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities, professional services required for the modernization, replacement, renovation, construction, and rebuilding of the school facilities projects and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries and other school operating expenses.

Evaluation of Needs. As required by Article XIII A of the California Constitution, the Board of Trustees of the District has certified that it has evaluated safety, the potential for future class size reduction and information technology needs in developing the list of school facilities projects shown below.

Projects Subject to Available Funding. The following list of projects is subject to the availability of adequate funding to the District. Approval of the bond proposition does not guarantee that the proposed projects in the District that are the subject of bonds under the proposition will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by the bond proposition. The District’s proposal for the projects may assume the receipt of matching state funds, which could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond proposition.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE I-10

This measure will determine whether the Atascadero Unified School District shall issue \$117 million in bonds, at an interest rate and for a term not to exceed the maximum permitted by law for the purpose of acquiring and improving school facilities within the District.

On November 7, 2000, the voters of California passed "Proposition 39," amending Article XIII A, section 1 and Article XVI, section 18 of the California Constitution. The amendments authorize the District to incur bonded indebtedness for the purpose of financing the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities upon approval of 55% of the voters.

If approved, this measure will allow the District to issue up to \$117 million in general obligation bonds. The bond proceeds will be used to acquire and improve school facilities within the District. The bonds and interest thereon would be financed by ad valorem taxes levied annually on taxable real property within the District and will increase the tax rate on real property within the District above 1% of the full cash value for the period necessary to pay the principal and interest on the bonds, as permitted by Article XIII A, section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution. The District's Tax Rate Statement, which accompanies this analysis, reflects an estimate of the maximum property tax levies required to service the bonds.

In accordance with the above-referenced constitutional provisions, Government Code sections 53410 and 53411 and Education Code section 15264 et seq., the measure contains the following requirements:

1. That the proceeds from the bond sale shall be used only for the purposes listed in the measure and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries and other operating expenses;
2. A list of the specific facilities projects to be funded and certification that the District Board has evaluated safety, class size reduction, and information technology needs in developing that list;
3. That the District Board will conduct an annual performance audit to ensure that the funds have been spent only on the specific facilities projects listed in the measure;
4. That the District Board will conduct an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the bond sales until all proceeds have been spent on the facilities projects listed in the measure;
5. That the District will maintain the proceeds from the bonds in a separate account and the District Superintendent shall cause a report to be filed annually with the District Board;
6. That the District Board shall establish a citizens' oversight committee to monitor expenditures and to ensure that bond proceeds are used to fund the specific projects listed in the measure.

A "Yes" vote on this measure is a vote in support of the issuance of \$117 million in general obligation bonds to be used for the purposes of improving school facilities within the District.

2. The best estimate of the tax rate that would be required to fund this bond issue during the first fiscal year after the sale of the last series of bonds, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$.0590 per \$100 (\$59.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation in fiscal year 2019-20.

3. The best estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to fund this bond issue, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing this statement, is \$.0590 per \$100 (\$59.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation.

4. The best estimate of the average tax rate required to fund this bond issue, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$.0590 per \$100 (\$59.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation.

These estimates are based on projections derived from information obtained from official sources. The actual tax rates and the years in which they will apply may vary depending on the timing of bond sales, the amount of bonds sold at each sale and actual increases in assessed valuations. The timing of the bond sales and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the needs of the District. Actual assessed valuations will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined in the assessment and the equalization process.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE C-10**

State law requires each California city to have a City Clerk. City Clerks may be either elected or appointed. This measure places before the voters the question whether the City Clerk should be an appointed rather than an elected position.

In Arroyo Grande the City Clerk is currently elected and serves a four year term. State law also establishes the qualifications for a City Clerk, requiring that the person elected to this position must be a registered voter and resident of the City. There are no requirements that candidates for City Clerk have any specific education, certification, or experience.

City Clerks perform limited duties as specified by state law, but are often called on to perform numerous related administrative duties. Some, but not all, of the City Clerk's duties include preparing, indexing, and maintaining accurate minutes of City Council meetings and all City documents and records; printing, assembling, and distributing Council agenda materials; administering municipal elections; receiving and maintaining candidate campaign forms and City officials' statements of economic interest; revising the City's conflict of interest code; preparing, mailing, and publishing all official City notices in a timely manner; and maintaining the Municipal Code.

State law authorizes the City Council to place on the ballot the question whether the City Clerk should be made appointive. If a majority of the voters approve making the position of City Clerk appointive, the City Council will have the authority to appoint a person to be City Clerk upon the expiration of the current term of office, or earlier if there is a vacancy. The City Council could establish qualifications such as education, certification and experience, and could appoint the person determined to be best qualified, regardless of that person's place of voter registration or residence. This measure would not change the duties of the City Clerk as established pursuant to state law.

A simple majority of YES votes would approve the measure, making the City Clerk an appointive office.

A majority of NO votes would reject the measure, in which case the City Clerk will continue to be an elective office.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE C-10

Your "YES" vote on Measure C-10 will convert the City Clerk position from elected to appointed and is placed before the voters to ensure the City's operations continue to be run efficiently by qualified individuals.

Historically, many cities have elected the city clerk to perform narrow statutory duties. However, as cities have grown and become more complex, the duties of the city clerk have significantly expanded and become more technical. City clerks now require a high level of expertise and training with knowledge of local and State laws relating to the Public Records Act, Brown Act (open meetings), Political Reform Act, Municipal Elections, and the Municipal Code. As a result, 72% of cities in California appoint their city clerks.

The majority of responsibilities of the Arroyo Grande City Clerk are performed by a department director position, making the elected position largely ceremonial. Since the same person currently holds both positions, Arroyo Grande has a highly qualified individual performing these functions and saves on benefits. However, should a vacancy occur, it may be difficult to find a qualified individual to run for the office of city clerk.

The only qualification to serve as elected city clerk is to be a registered City voter. A recent Grand Jury report found that "health benefits alone may be sufficient to attract unqualified persons to run for [city clerk], leaving the work to City staff and costing the cities health benefits for persons performing no useful function." The public deserves the duties of the city clerk to be performed professionally and efficiently. Consolidating the director position with the elected position into one appointed position will reduce future costs and help ensure the city clerk is selected based on technical skill, education and experience.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE D-10**

State law requires each California city to have a City Treasurer. City Treasurers may be either elected or appointed. This measure places before the voters the question whether the City Treasurer should be an appointed rather than an elected position.

In Arroyo Grande the City Treasurer is currently elected and serves a four year term. State law also establishes the qualifications for a City Treasurer, requiring that the person elected to this position must be a registered voter and resident of the City. There are no requirements that candidates for this office have any specific education, certification, or experience.

State law provides that City Treasurers are responsible for overseeing municipal finances. They must comply with state laws governing the deposit and handling of public funds and provide written accountings of all municipal funds. The day-to-day duties associated with the office of City Treasurer for the City of Arroyo Grande, however, are handled by the Director of Administrative Services who is also the deputy city treasurer. The elected City Treasurer serves in a largely ceremonial capacity to comply with State law.

State law authorizes the City Council to place on the ballot the question whether the position of City Treasurer should be made appointive. If a majority of the voters approve making the position appointive, the City Council will have the authority to appoint a person to this position upon the expiration of the current term of office, or earlier if there is a vacancy. The City Council could establish qualifications such as education, certification and experience, and could appoint the person determined to be best qualified, regardless of that person's place of voter registration or residence. This measure would not change the duties of the City Treasurer as established pursuant to state law.

A simple majority of YES votes would approve the measure, making the City Treasurer an appointive office.

A majority of NO votes would reject the measure, in which case the City Treasurer will continue to be an elective office.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE D-10

Your "Yes" vote on Measure D-10 will convert the city treasurer from an elected to an appointed position and is placed before the voters to help ensure the City's financial resources continue to be managed effectively by qualified individuals.

The city treasurer is responsible for handling all public funds. Therefore, the position requires a person who possesses technical experience and knowledge of public investments. As a result, 64% of California cities appoint their city treasurers.

The most recent City treasurers have held other full-time City positions and deputized the finance director to perform the treasurer's responsibilities. Therefore, the position has become largely ceremonial and is not currently receiving separate health benefits. However, other individuals elected in the future could: 1) increase costs by requiring the City to provide separate benefits to a person performing no function; or 2) cause serious financial problems if an unqualified individual was elected and performed the treasurer's responsibilities.

A recent Grand Jury report agreed, stating the following:

There are reasons to be especially concerned about the practice of electing city treasurers. Any citizen who is a resident of the city can run for the office, without possessing any particular qualifications. If a candidate with an agenda markedly at odds with the city council and the city manager – one with little commitment to professional investing, for example – were to win, many millions of city dollars could be at risk or, alternatively, tied up in a dispute over power.

The report concluded that the City could benefit from an appointed city treasurer. This will enable the treasurer's responsibilities to be assigned to the finance director, which will reduce future costs and help ensure they are performed by someone selected based on skill, education and experience.

The Arroyo Grande City Council urges you to vote "Yes" on Measure D-10.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURES E-10, F-10, & G-10

There are five City Council Members in the City of Atascadero. Currently, one of the five Council Members serves as Mayor, who is selected by a majority vote of the Council. This procedure is authorized by Government Code Section 36801. However, upon a majority vote of the citizens of a city on a ballot measure, there can be a direct election of the mayor by voters pursuant to Government Code Sections 34900 - 34906.

A mayor elected by the voters is a member of the city council and has all of the powers and duties of a member of the city council. A mayor elected by the voters has the same powers as a mayor selected by a vote of the City Council. Government Code § 34903.

There are three measures on the ballot relating to the election of Mayor in the City of Atascadero:

1. Shall the electors elect a Mayor and four Council Members? Yes or No.
2. Shall the term of office of mayor be two years? Yes or No.
3. Shall the term of office of mayor be four years? Yes or No.

Voters may vote on one, two or all three of these measures. The first measure asks whether the voters shall elect the Mayor and four Council Members. Since the Council Members in Atascadero are currently elected by the voters, the only change if the first measure is passed would be to provide for the Mayor to be elected by the voters rather than selected by the City Council. If the first measure receives a majority of yes votes at the election, then the term of the Mayor, two years or four years, shall be that preferred by a majority of those voting on the measures.

Atascadero should have an elected mayor. Ban on Medical Marijuana Dispensaries in Morro Bay

Medical Marijuana dispensaries are prohibited in all zoning districts within the City of Morro Bay. No use permit, variance, business license or other applicable entitlement or approval will be accepted, approved or issued by the City of Morro Bay for the establishment or operation of a medical marijuana dispensary.

A medical marijuana dispensary is defined as any facility in a single fixed location where a primary caregiver makes available, sells, transmits, gives, or otherwise provides medical marijuana or cannabis for medical purposes to two or more qualified patients or persons with an identification card in accordance with Health and Safety Code section 11362.5

A medical marijuana dispensary shall not include the following uses as long as the location of such uses area is otherwise regulated by this Code or applicable law: a clinic licensed pursuant to Chapter 1 of Division 2 of the Health and Safety Code; a health care facility for persons with chronic life-threatening illness, licensed pursuant to Chapter 301 of Division 2 of the Health and Safety Code; a residential care facility for the elderly licensed pursuant to Chapter 32 of Division 2 of the Health and Safety Code; a residential hospice or a home health agency licensed pursuant to Chapter 8 of Division 2 of the Health and Safety Code; as long as any such use complies strictly with applicable California and federal law.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE B-10

Measure B-10 appears on the ballot as a result of initiative petitions which gathered more than the number of signatures required by state law for placement on the ballot. If enacted, the measure would require the City of Morro Bay to amend its Municipal Code to prohibit Medical Marijuana Dispensaries.

Under the Federal Controlled Substances Act, marijuana is classified as a Schedule I controlled substance. This federal law makes it illegal to import, manufacture, distribute, possess, or use marijuana in the United States. Use of marijuana is also prohibited under the California Uniform Controlled Substances Act.

In 1996, California voters enacted the Compassionate Use Act, which protects qualified patients and their primary caregivers from prosecution under California laws for possession or cultivation of marijuana to treat serious illness pursuant to a doctor's recommendation. In 2003, the state legislature passed legislation (SB 420) to allow qualified patients and caregivers to obtain identification cards that insulate them from arrest for cultivation and/or use of marijuana for authorized medical purposes.

Since the passage of the Compassionate Use Act, many cities in California have allowed "storefront" marijuana businesses, often called dispensaries. These facilities operate like pharmacies and dispense different types of marijuana and some offer baked goods that contain marijuana. However, under federal law, these storefront dispensaries are illegal so many other cities in California have banned them from operating.

One purpose of the Compassionate Use Act and SB 420 is to encourage the federal and state governments to implement a plan to provide for the safe and affordable distribution of marijuana to all patients in medical need of marijuana. However, neither the federal nor the state government has implemented a plan to provide medical marijuana under these guidelines and current law does not explicitly address the role of dispensaries, nor does it require cities provide for or allow the establishment and/or operation of medical marijuana dispensaries.

The ongoing conflict between federal and state law on this subject has created a dilemma for local governments with regard to medical marijuana dispensaries. The Municipal Code for the City of Morro Bay currently does not address or regulate in any manner the existence or location of Medical Marijuana Dispensaries within the City of Morro Bay.

Measure B-10 would amend the Morro Bay Municipal Code to prohibit Medical Marijuana Dispensaries and prohibit the City from issuing any permits, variances, licenses and entitlements for Medical Marijuana Dispensaries. A Medical Marijuana Dispensary is defined as any facility in a single fixed location that sells, transmits, gives, or otherwise provides medical marijuana.

If enacted, Measure B-10 would not prohibit nor eliminate the availability and use of medical marijuana in the City. Measure B-10 is also not in conflict with California Proposition 19, the Marijuana Legalization Initiative. If California Proposition 19 and Measure B-10 both pass, people 21 years old or older would be allowed to possess, cultivate, or transport marijuana for personal use; however marijuana could not be sold in a fixed retail location in Morro Bay.

How can that possibly be reconciled with storefronts selling a drug illegal under Federal Law? Families not wanting to expose their children to that environment will vacation in Pismo Beach or Cayucos. After the "patient" buys medical marijuana what is to prevent that individual from selling it to a teenager?

The Morro Bay police department is adamantly opposed to allowing a marijuana dispensary in the city. They know that crime will increase. Morro Bay's finances are already stressed. Medical Marijuana dispensaries in our business districts will only deter legitimate patrons from shopping. They will go elsewhere, robbing the City of much needed sales tax. City services will suffer.

Regardless of the results of this election marijuana still is a Schedule One Narcotic under Federal Law.

If medical marijuana dispensaries are such a great idea, why has every other San Luis Obispo County community turned them down? Vote Yes on Measure B-10.

Safe, comfortable, dignified access to medical marijuana is **precisely** the issue. Access to medical cannabis only through home delivery causes suffering patients to feel stigmatized and discriminated against; many would prefer the sterile, open environment of a dispensary over home delivery.

Any dispensary allowed will bring more good to the city than harm. It won't affect tourism in the slightest. More patients would travel to Morro Bay due to access to their medication, thus it will likely draw locals of other communities to spend money in Morro Bay.

A dispensary would maintain a price on medications where no value could be made through re-sale on the street. Re-selling is illegal, and a violator would be banned from future dispensary visits. Pharmacies also have the issue with re-selling of prescription medications. Dispensaries would be mandated to check IDs and doctors' recommendations. Products carried by pharmacies, cigarette and liquor stores pose much greater dangers to teenagers than a dispensary ever would.

The mantra that dispensaries cause crime doesn't really bear out, according to numerous studies and Los Angeles Police Chief Charlie Beck. "Banks are more likely to get robbed than medical marijuana dispensaries," Beck said.

REBUTTAL TO ARGUMENT AGAINST MEASURE B-10

The arguments used for voting against Measure B by the folks who want to allow Medical Marijuana Dispensaries in Morro Bay are flawed.

Their claim that local patients are denied access to medical marijuana is not true. IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE H-10**

This measure will determine whether the San Luis Obispo Margarita Area Specific Plan (MASP), Airport Area Specific Plan (AASP), the General Plan Land Use and Circulation Elements, and the City's Zoning Map will be amended to eliminate a portion of the Prado Road northern alignment adopted by the City Council. The currently planned northern alignment, which would connect Prado Road to Broad Street between Industrial Way and Capitolio, was incorporated into the City's General Plan Circulation Element by City Council Resolution 9012 (2000 Series) and incorporated into the MASP by City Council Resolution 9615 (2004 Series).

A portion of the adopted Prado Road alignment is planned to cross the northwest edge of the City-owned Damon-Garcia property and connect to Broad Street. The City sports fields located on that property were constructed after the adoption of the current road alignment and no portion of the roadway would encroach into any existing or planned sports fields.

If this measure passes, it would eliminate the segment of the roadway currently planned to connect Prado Road in the Margarita Area to Broad Street. The measure would amend City planning and zoning maps to reflect a Prado Road alignment that terminates at the western boundary of the City-owned Damon-Garcia property with no through connection to an alternate circulation route. The measure would also prohibit any development or the location of any public streets, roadways or highways within the boundaries of the City owned Damon-Garcia property and on the adjacent "South Hills" property to the north and west of the City property. The term "development" is not defined in the measure. The adjacent South Hills property is privately owned and is currently zoned as conservation/open space.

The measure also proposes map amendments to the MASP and AASP that eliminate water and sewer lines currently planned to be located within the segment of Prado Road that would be eliminated by the measure.

Alternatives to the current Prado Road alignment and the location of water and sewer lines have not been studied since the adoption of the current roadway alignment and the construction of the Damon-Garcia Sports Fields. Thus, if the measure passes, further study will be necessary to determine whether previously studied, alternate circulation and infrastructure routes are feasible and in compliance with the requirements of the measure.

The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) will not require a study to determine the environmental impacts of any of the planning and zoning amendments proposed by the measure.

A yes vote on this measure is a vote in favor of amending the MASP and all other affected City planning and zoning documents to eliminate the segment of the currently planned Prado Road alignment that crosses the City-owned Damon-Garcia property boundary.

A no vote on this measure is a vote against amending the MASP and all other affected City planning and zoning documents to eliminate the segment of the currently planned Prado Road alignment, leaving the currently planned alignment in place.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE H-10

Measure H gives voters a rare opportunity to preserve 4 acres of land for recreation and safeguard the open, natural connection between the South Hills Open Space and the popular Damon-Garcia Sports Fields.

By voting YES on Measure H you will help improve our city by securing the following benefits:

1. Stop the construction of a busy, elevated, four-lane truck-route highway and a large, new concrete bridge within the Damon-Garcia Sports Fields site.
2. Protect those who use the sports complex from the added noise and air pollution created by 14,000 new daily vehicle trips next to the sports fields and trail areas in the South Hills Open Space.
3. Preserve important local environmental features, including Acacia Creek, serpentine rock outcroppings, and significant archaeological sites.
4. Allow the City to develop alternative routes for extending Prado Road and moving east-west traffic more efficiently, without adding more traffic signals on Broad Street that would slow traffic.
5. Promote enhanced bicycle / pedestrian facilities and bus rapid transit to increase traffic efficiency and other forward-thinking traffic measures that save fuel and reduce greenhouse emissions.

The City Council approved the Prado Road "Northern Alignment" on a narrow 3-2 vote without the detailed Environmental Impact Report (EIR) which the Planning Commission had recommended. The "Northern Alignment" runs through the northern part of the Sports Fields site, very close to existing sports fields. Measure H amends the General Plan to eliminate the "Northern Alignment" segment and also prohibits roads in the adjacent South Hills Open Space area.

This is your chance to add more recreation area to our city, protect citizens' health, provide for our children's safety, and find better traffic solutions. Your vote will preserve the quality of life that citizens of San Luis Obispo value most.

ARGUMENT AGAINST MEASURE H-10

The San Luis Obispo City Council unanimously urges you to vote NO on Measure H, the proposal to dead-end the extension of Prado Road to Broad Street.

Measure H's advocates have recklessly used misleading arguments to make their case, even alleging that Prado Road will cut through the Damon-Garcia playing fields. That's utterly false.

Here's the truth: The Prado Road extension and bicycle paths will be safely fenced, elevated, landscaped, and routed well clear of the playing fields. When Prado is extended it will remain as far – or farther - from the fields as Broad Street is now.

In all ways, Measure H is a DEAD-END.

Measure H would slow police, fire, and ambulance response; cause more traffic congestion, air pollution, and neighborhood safety hazards; and delay efforts to create more middle-class housing.

REBUTTAL TO ARGUMENT AGAINST MEASURE H-10

Opponents are fanning the flames of fear with false and radical rhetoric.

The DEAD-END is the city's current plan. After cutting across the sports field property, Prado Road would dead-end at Broad Street. All four lanes of traffic would turn onto Broad at a new traffic signal, causing congestion and disrupting cross-town traffic.

The city spends millions of dollars for recreation and open space. When the city spent taxpayer money for the Damon-Garcia property for sports fields, the highway through the property was NOT approved.

Proposals for future traffic include a four-lane, realigned Santa Fe Road from Prado to Buckley, then Buckley to the freeway. Tank Farm Road will become four lanes. These road changes will be phased with future development.

In 2002, Dave Romero called the connection of Prado Road to Tank Farm Road the best alternative for cross-town Prado traffic. It would eliminate conflicts with the sports fields and decrease the amount of environmental damage. We think he was correct.

None of the plans for new housing and businesses will be hindered by eliminating the short portion of Prado Road through the sports field site. Nor is the scary story of slowing public safety response true.

The 1st page is the current report, run 56 days prior to the November 2010 election.

The 2nd page is the 15 day close report, just prior to the November 2008 Presidential election.

The 3rd page is the 15 day close report, just prior to the November 2006 Gubernatorial election.

Comparison between 2010 - Gubernatorial and 2008-Presidential elections

- Overall registration decreased by 9,164 (5.7%)
- Democratic Party Registration decreased 4,409 (7.6%)
- Republican Party Registration decreased 3,207 (5.0%)
- Voters who have declined to state a political party preference decreased 1,462(4.5%)

Comparison between 2010 and 2006- Both Gubernatorial elections

- Overall registration decreased by 3,406 (2.2 %)
- The Democratic Party registration decreased 1,094 (2%)
- The Republican Party registration decreased 3,721 (5.7%)
- Voters who have declined to state a political party preference have increased 2,704 (9.5%)

These fluctuations in voter registration totals for these 3 elections are due to 2 factors:

1) There is typically more interest in the Presidential elections and San Luis Obispo County experienced a large influx of new registrations for the 2008 election. The voter registration totals increased by almost 10,000 in the last 45 days before this election.

2) It is always a challenge to keep the voter rolls clean because many of our voters are very mobile and do not always notify the elections office of their address change. The special elections held in May 2009, and June and August of this year have helped “clean the rolls” by providing postal notification of address changes and that a voter has moved out of the county. In essence the current registration numbers represent a more accurate snapshot of the valid voters, although over the next 45 days, these numbers will increase as the registration activity picks up in preparation for the November election.
